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# *One Body, Many Members: Respecting Differences and Diversity*

**WEEK 4 – WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 25, 2026 – 12:00 NOON**

## **Main Scripture Passages**

- 1 Corinthians 12:12–27
- Revelation 7:9–10 (supporting)

## **Lesson Focus**

The emotionally healthy church honors God-given differences rather than fearing or resenting them. Paul uses the body metaphor to show that diversity of gifts and backgrounds is part of God’s design, not a problem to be solved. This lesson emphasizes respect, inclusion, and valuing “weaker” members, along with a vision of the multi-ethnic church in glory.

## **Key Words with Definitions**

- **One Body, Many Members** – A picture of the church as a single organism with many distinct, necessary parts.
- **Baptized into One Body** – United by the Holy Spirit into Christ, regardless of ethnic, social, or cultural differences.
- **Weaker Members** – Those who may seem less impressive or visible, but whom God declares indispensable.
- **Honor** – To assign weight, value, and respect, especially to those often overlooked.
- **No Division in the Body** – A goal where care, value, and concern prevent factions and favoritism.

## **Lesson Background**

The church in Corinth was spiritually gifted but deeply divided—over leaders, social status, and spiritual experiences. Some believers saw themselves as more important because of their gifts or background. Paul confronts this by using the human body as an illustration: every part is needed, and no part can say to another, “I have no need of you.”

Paul insists that God has arranged the members as He chose, intentionally giving different gifts and functions. He pays special attention to those considered weaker or less honorable, affirming that God gives them greater honor. Revelation 7 expands the vision to a global scale: a great multitude from **every nation, tribe, people, and language** worshiping before God’s throne.

## Reading the Word

### Key exegetical words/phrases and explanation

1. **“For just as the body is one and has many members” (1 Corinthians 12:12)**

Paul grounds his teaching in a simple, familiar image. The church’s unity and diversity are not in competition; they are complementary.

2. **“All were baptized into one body” (12:13)**

The Spirit places believers into Christ regardless of background—Jew or Greek, slave or free. Spiritual unity transcends social categories.

3. **“If the foot should say... because I am not a hand, I do not belong” (12:15)**

Paul addresses feelings of inferiority. Emotional health includes recognizing our worth and calling even when we differ from others.

4. **“The eye cannot say to the hand, ‘I have no need of you’” (12:21)**

Here Paul addresses superiority. No gift, role, culture, or group is allowed to dismiss another as unnecessary.

5. **“On those parts... we think less honorable we bestow the greater honor” (12:23)**

God’s value system reverses ours. The church is called to intentionally uplift and care for those often ignored or undervalued.

6. **“That there may be no division in the body” (12:25)**

The goal is not sameness but mutual care. Emotional and spiritual maturity are seen where differences do not become fault lines.

7. **“A great multitude... from every nation” (Revelation 7:9)**

The final picture of the church is multi-ethnic and multi-lingual. Diversity is not a temporary problem but an eternal reality in God’s kingdom.

### Implications for Today

In our time, churches must navigate differences in gifts, education, age, culture, race, and economics. An emotionally unhealthy church avoids talking about these realities or quietly allows favoritism to flourish. An emotionally healthy church **names and addresses differences** with humility, respect, and intentional honor.

Respect for diversity does not mean abandoning truth; it means recognizing that God works through various people and cultures. When we learn to value one another across differences, we reflect the heart of Christ and give a preview of the worship scene in Revelation 7.

## **Lesson Principles to Learn**

### **1. Diversity in the Body Is God’s Design, Not an Accident**

God arranges the members as He chooses. Emotional and spiritual maturity accept and celebrate that we are not all the same. Different gifts, backgrounds, and perspectives strengthen the church’s witness.

### **2. Feelings of Inferiority and Superiority Both Harm the Body**

Some believers feel they “don’t belong”; others act as if they are more important. Both attitudes undermine unity. Emotionally healthy churches affirm each member’s value and address pride and insecurity with grace.

### **3. Honoring Overlooked Members Is a Mark of Maturity**

Paul calls for greater honor for those considered weaker or less respectable. This means noticing quiet servants, listening to quieter voices, and making room for those often pushed to the margins.

### **4. The Church on Earth Should Reflect the Diversity of Heaven**

Revelation 7 shows a multi-ethnic, multi-lingual worshipping people. While every church context is different, believers are called to resist prejudice, welcome diversity, and practice respect. Emotional maturity includes handling cultural differences with humility and love.

## **Case Study**

A congregation includes long-time members from one cultural background and newer members from different ethnic and generational backgrounds. Some newer members feel unseen in leadership and programming. Some older members feel uncomfortable with new ideas and worry about losing their “church feel.”

After studying 1 Corinthians 12 and Revelation 7, the church begins intentional conversations. They form a diverse planning team for worship and ministries, invite testimonies from newer members, and ask, “Who is not yet at the table?” Over time, the church becomes more welcoming, more representative of its community, and more joyful in its shared identity in Christ.

### **Group Discussion Question:**

What specific steps can our church take to better honor differences in gifts, culture, and background while maintaining unity in Christ?

## **Summary Paragraph**

Paul’s picture of the church as “one body with many members” challenges us to reject both inferiority and superiority. God designed His church to be diverse—gift-wise, culture-wise, and personality-wise—and calls us to honor one another deeply. Revelation 7 shows where this is heading: a diverse people worshipping one Lord. Emotionally healthy churches begin living that reality now, respecting differences and practicing unity rooted in Christ.
